The Right to Water, recognized by India's judiciary, lacks legislative or executive endorsement but is enforced through administrative directives. Rural water is managed via community development schemes, while urban areas rely on municipal laws. Post–1992, local bodies oversee water, with central support primarily in rural regions, including the AMRUT Scheme, aimed at urban water and infrastructure improvement.

The AMRUT initiative, launched in 2015, seeks to enhance urban life by ensuring equitable water access. A 6-month empirical study supported by ICSSR assesses AMRUT's impact on Bengaluru's water rights, examining equity, inclusivity, and conservation. It investigates financial barriers to access and the scheme's role in promoting conservation. This workshop brings together experts and stakeholders to discuss executive-led water schemes' contribution to realizing the right to water and fulfilling constitutional obligations.

Objectives of the Workshop

- The workshop aims to share and promote the findings of the project focused on assessing how AMRUT has helped drinking water, connections, and its benefits to urban dwellers of Bengaluru city.
- 2. This workshop will bring the process, benefits, and beneficiaries of water connections under the AMRUT scheme.
- 3. The workshop aims to raise awareness among urban residents about water conservation and its practices.
