FOREWORD

It has been a year of transition for the Queer Archive for Memory, Reflection and Activism (QAMRA) at the National Law School of India University, Bengaluru. We have a new team in place and are prioritising consolidating cataloguing our processes and infrastructure and strengthening our expertise, skills and capacity. We have made strong progress in the last six to eight months as we have engaged with diverse publics through focussed engagements, including workshops, events, and interactions with a growing and diverse set of audiences. These include students, faculty, staff and researchers at NLSIU and other educational institutions in Bengaluru; researchers and visitors to the archive, a steady stream of interns, archivists from institutions from across the world; documentary filmmakers; librarians, academics, queer activists, and the wider queer community.

We have expanded and reorganised our collection, improved the infrastructure to house it, and implemented stringent procedures to monitor environmental and climatic conditions that could affect its long-term preservation. We have streamlined our processes within the administrative apparatus at NLSIU and have gradually grasped the unique position and advantages of being a community archive situated within a public educational institution.

Through the eyes of researchers and other visitors to our archive, we have learnt to appreciate better the unique nature and strengths of our collection and how the significance of continuing to preserve local queer histories and memories in a time of rapid social and technological change.

We thank the many individuals who have kept this archive running for the past 7 years, as we welcome our <u>new team</u>. We would especially like to thank members of the advisory team, T. Jayashree, Arvind Narrain, Vivek Divan, Curt Gambetta and Deeptha Rao for their work and strong support in this transitional phase. QAMRA has received two small grants, which have facilitated the hiring of our new team. We have Gauri Mahajan as our Project Associate, Anusha George as our Project Assistant, and Mira Brunner as our Chief Archivist. Being situated at NLSIU, we now have a Faculty Director, <u>Dr. Siddharth Narrain</u>. Our advisory team has also expanded to include the educator, writer and a digital and public humanities scholar, <u>Dr. Kush Patel</u> from the Srishti School of Art, Design and Technology, Manipal Institute of Higher Education (MAHE), Bengaluru. We also thank <u>Prof. Kunal Ambasta</u> for supporting QAMRA in the past year at NLSIU.

With the new team and space in place since November 2024, QAMRA began its operations in full swing and reopened for researchers and visitors. We also have two long-term researchers – Alice Baudequin and Ikshaku Bezbaroa, who are both PhD scholars, with QAMRA as their site.

We thank our volunteers, interns, long-term donors, patrons, and everyone who has contributed time, effort, and resources to engage with the work we do at QAMRA.

QAMRA IN THE PUBLIC EYE

Public Online Lecture (International Archives Week 2024)

As a part of the International Archives Week (June 3 - June 9, 2024) our former team member, Ammel Sharon, presented in a webinar titled 'In the Dream House: Examining the New Archival Turn in India' on June 7, 2024. The talk explored archives as records, institutions, and spaces, comparing them with libraries and museums, reflecting on post-independence Indian archives, and highlighting QAMRA at NLSIU as a vital living archive of gender and sexuality.

Ammel Sharon was in conversation with Arvind Narrain at the Bangalore International Centre at an event called 'Redefining Unions: The Future of LGBTQ+ Rights & Marriage Equality in India', June 16, 2024. 

QAMRA @ Feminist Archiving Conference, Pune


It felt like the archive would hold some kind of historical evidence that could explain why and how I could be a free and out queer person, a kind of moral and political ancestry.

RESEARCHERS & VISITORS @ QAMRA

We have had many other visitors from various backgrounds, expressing their interest and engaging with QAMRA's material and archival processes. These include faculty and students from the Institute of Psychology and Research, the National Centre of Biological Studies, Azim Premji University, and Manipal Academy of Higher Education, as well as archivists and librarians from the Azim Premji University library. We have also hosted visitors from other organisations such as the iHEAR team at Sangath, Azim Premji Foundation, and professionals from other allied fields.

We have also hosted visits to QAMRA's offsite location at T. Jayashree's studio in Cooke Town – Dr. Kush Patel brought their MA students there for a week long workshop on archival practice.

Their space is calm, welcoming, freely accessible, and infrastructurally suited to quiet research work. I have now been at the archive thrice and looked at the MSIP collection. It has been humbling to learn about all the work that has gone past, and also deeply inspiring. I hope to return soon!

QAMRA is far larger and granular than I had initially been led to believe from its website and hearsay. The fact that collections are organised according to 'donor' respects the source yet allows for creative meaning-making. I value how the worlds layered within worlds only become apparent after some time spent, and thus behove an invested engagement from the researcher.

UPCOMING @ QAMRA

We aim to host the Identifier Workshop in the upcoming months, which will help us come up with better archival practices suited to queer-trans realities in India. We also aim to digitise and make accessible two collections by the end of the year – Maya Sharma Indra Pathak, and the Queer Legal Collection, improving the online accessibility of our collections.
