## ‘The Rise of FOSS in India’ - A Report

A recent NLSIU project report titled “The Rise of FOSS in India: Empirical Evidence and Insights from Cross-Sectoral Case Studies” examines the adoption and impact of Free and Open-Source Software (FOSS) across the country. Drawing on case studies from four sectors – healthcare, education, finance, and software & IT services – the report analyses how different organisations are leveraging FOSS.

The study finds that while organisations benefit from greater innovation, cost and time efficiency, flexibility, and enhanced security, they also encounter challenges such as a shortage of skilled professionals and limited community support.

The project was funded by the Samagata Foundation, and the report was officially launched at the “Round Table on FOSS in India” held in July 2025 in New Delhi.

## The Karnataka Devadasi Bill, 2025: A Landmark Framework by Centre

## for the Study of Social Inclusion, NLSIU

In August 2025, the Karnataka State Cabinet approved the transformative and comprehensive model legislation for the Karnataka Devadasi (Prevention, Prohibition, Redress and Rehabilitation) Act, 2025 submitted by the Centre for the Study of Social Inclusion (CSSI) at NLSIU, Bengaluru. The proposed law represents a holistic and rights-based strategy to dismantle the Devadasi system — an oppressive and illegal social practice still prevalent in parts of Karnataka despite historical bans.

The draft law reflects seven months of field research, consultations, discussions and dialogues initiated by the Talasamudaayagala Adhyayana Kendra at NLSIU in collaboration with Devadasi Community members, Government of Karnataka, NGOs, State universities and activists working for the empowerment and emancipation of the Devadasi community for erasing the Devadasi practice in its intent and practice. Students from the Master's Programme in Public Policy (MPP) at NLSIU provided research support in this initiative.

## Assessment Report of Women in the Karnataka State Police: Experiences, Challenges and Opportunities

Karnataka has only 8.91% women in its police force, well below the national average of 12.73%, and behind States like Bihar, which has the highest share at 23.66%. As part of the 'Strengthening the Role of Women in Karnataka State Police' project, funded by the Hanns Seidel Stiftung, NLSIU conducted an independent assessment of the status, role and challenges facing policewomen at different levels within the Karnataka State Police. Key

findings include under-representation in leadership, exclusion from investigations, and safety concerns during night duty. The report recommends reforms such as increasing the reservation for women to 33% and implementing gender-responsive policies.

The study involved a) district and police station-wise assessment of women's representation at different ranks across the state; and b) ground assessment of challenges faced by policewomen in Karnataka.

## 'Unmaking Citizens': A Comprehensive Study of Assam's Foreigners Tribunals

The Access to Justice in Citizenship Determination project at NLSIU partnered with Queen Mary University of London to undertake a legal analysis of the foreigner's tribunal in Assam. The analysis culminated with a comprehensive report titled "Unmaking Citizens: The Architecture of Rights Violations and Exclusion in India's Citizenship Trials" based on a review of over 1,000 High Court cases, landmark Supreme Court rulings, and in-depth field interviews. It reveals a legal system in deep crisis: over 1,65,000 people have already been declared "foreigners," with more than 85,000 cases pending and more than 1 million NRC appeals potentially headed to these opaque tribunals.

## **Project on “Reforms in the Military Justice System”**

We are proud to announce our successful bid with the Indian Army for a study on “Reforms in the Military Justice System”. Following a long open process that started in July 2023, the University signed the MoU on October 17, 2025 with the Institute of Military Law that is anchoring the project on behalf of the Indian Army. The first-of-its-kind study will review the legal framework governing the military justice system in India, evaluate the effectiveness of internal disciplinary procedures, assess the integration of technology and explore the use of alternate dispute resolution mechanisms for military justice. NLS will submit a comprehensive report with targeted legal and policy recommendations. Dr. Mrinal Satish, Professor of Law & Dean - Research, will lead the project with Manish and Rahul Raman (Assistant Professors of Law) as the lead researchers.

## **Project on “Legal challenges facing the advertising regulatory ecosystem in India”**

The Chair on Consumer Law and Practice (CLAP) at NLSIU is partnering with the Advertising Standards Council of India (ASCI) to analyse legal challenges surrounding advertising regulation in India. The project will organise multi-stakeholder roundtables, an annual summit and develop legal resources for training and capacity building. Dr. Sudhanshu Kumar, Associate Professor of Law, and Meenakshi Ramkumar, Assistant Professor of Law, are steering this research.

NLSIU's Queer Archive for Memory Reflection and Activism (QAMRA) in collaboration with the Queer Judgements Project (QJP), hosted a book discussion on 'Queer Judgements,' an edited collection.
